

Enlivening the waterfront - proposals due May 12

A new opportunity is emerging for Charlestown Navy Yard to become more engaging and attractive for residents, visitors, and employees. The Boston Planning and Development Agency (formerly the BRA) is requesting proposals from entities who might carry out ideas outlined in a plan completed in 2007 for "activating" the waterfront. Sal LaMattina to retire

Representing Charlestown on the Boston City Council for 11 years, Sal LaMattina has announced he will retire after his term is completed in January. LaMattina has worked for the City in several capacities for 30 years during which time he has been a strong advocate for neighborhood services, including safety, clean streets, parks, and schools. His considerable energies have also gone to advocating for expanded water ferry service to connect Boston's waterfront neighborhoods. Besides Charlestown, District 1 includes East Boston and the North End. The Friends of Charlestown Navy Yard plan to thank him in a public event before his retirement.



Typically, preliminary elections are held in September, followed by municipal elections in November. This year's District 1 Council race has already attracted several candidates.

Tall Ships

When tall ships return to Boston this year, about five of these worldclass giants will be docked in the Navy Yard for five days. On Saturday, June 17, the "Parade of Sail" will proceed into the inner harbor, making their turn-around at Charlestown. The Boston National Historical Park will be the focus of activities, food and drink stands, and ship boarding. Organizers were expected to provide information for residents at a meeting on April 20, 6:30 p.m. at Spaulding Rehabilitation Hospital.

Garden group to beautify Navy Yard gardens

Impelled by the arrival of Tall Ships in June, an independent volunteer group has been formed to raise funds

to enhance the small gardens between Piers 4 and 6. Robin DiGiammarino reports that the Navy Yard Garden Association aims to raise \$20,000 this year. They will remove old plantings, replenish the soil, and install more than 300 plants in two gardens, followed by assistance to all the gardens in the Navy Yard in future phases.
